Fall is just around the corner, and I can't wait! September & October are my favorite months – the weather cools down and it's prime knitting weather, and the holiday crazies haven't kicked in yet. Perfect.

So, with summer ending, we'll be going back to our regular hours starting September 4th:

New Stuff

We've been getting some new yarns in the shop, and there's more to come! Here are the most recent arrivals:

- **Boku** – Wool & silk, worsted. A beautiful self-stripping wool/silk blend with gradual color shifts. Affordable price and softer than some of the other similar yarns.
- **Suri Merino** – Suri alpaca & merino wool, worsted. Soft & supple; will create light and warm garments or accessories.
- **Cocoon** – Superwash merino wool, fingering. A super soft yarn that's great for baby items, lacy scarves, and the nylon content makes it durable enough for socks. Easy care!
- **Plymouth Tweed** – 100% lambswool, worsted. Soft lambswool with rich tweeded colors – both classic & sporty.
- **Harmony needles** – I usually find 12" circular needles difficult to knit with; however Harmony has made some to our specifications with shorter bamboo tips making them easier to use. With very flexible cables & smooth joins, these would be nice for baby hats or the arms of small children's sweaters. We also have 5" DPN's available from Harmony.
- **Heathered Bulky** from Harrisville Designs – 100% wool, bulky. If you read my blog, you might already know that I have a special place in my heart for all of the Harrisville yarns. Heathered Bulky is no exception. It's just so wooly, heathered and pretty!

New Feature: Yarn of the Month

Something new! Each month, I'm going to be featuring a different yarn. Some months, it'll be a yarn that's new to the shop; other months it might be one of the unsung heroes or good old standbys. But here's what it means to be the YOTM:

- Free mini "play-with-it" skeins – about 4 yards or so, depending on the yarn; enough for you to take a little test run with it.
- 10% discount during the month.
- Free one or two skein patterns available with purchase.

September's Yarn of the Month

Boku, from Plymouth Yarn, is our first YOTM. It is a worsted weight yarn made of 95% wool, 5% silk. As I mentioned earlier in this newsletter, Boku is self-stripping, with gradual color shifts. It's a great choice for many projects: sweaters, slippers, scarves, hats, mittens, and it felts beautifully. At \$6.20/50 gram skein, it's more affordable *and* softer than some of the other similar yarns. During September, at 10% off, it'll be even more affordable – consider it for your next project!

On the Internet

Many of you have discovered that the web is an excellent resource for knitting information, inspiration, and patterns. There are online magazines, tutorials, free patterns, and blogs. But be warned: time can get away from you online...and that can cut into your knitting time! This month I thought I'd highlight some of my favorite online pattern resources.

Knittingdaily.com

This is a daily newsletter by Interweave Knits. The newsletters are educational & fun to read. When you sign up (for free), you get access to their online pattern library, which has a lot of very nice patterns at all skill levels. The site is also a great reference when you come across an unfamiliar technique.

Knitty.com

Knitty is a quarterly online knitting magazine that offers articles about knitting, trends, techniques...lots of stuff. But I think Knitty is best known for their patterns. Every quarter they offer around 15 – 20 new projects. A lot of the patterns are on the trendy, hip side (hmmm...not sure if people say "hip" anymore – I'm so *not* hip), but there's always something I'd like to knit.

Magknits.com

Magknits is another fun online resource. They don't have articles, but they do offer free patterns every month or so. It's not as *slick* as Knitty, but it has it's own charm. One thing I like about Magknits is that a lot of the patterns seem to be written by people with day jobs, not professional designers. It seems like a good way to start dabbling with designing & pattern writing.


